

Leadership School. Taking advantage of virtual technology, Centro Santa Angela's school for community leaders expanded its reach in 2022 to all of Peru. The school, which was founded in 2014 in the populous and rapidly growing municipality of José Leonardo Ortiz, Chiclayo, is dedicated to developing leadership that is democratic, transparent, inclusive and committed to human and community development. Also new this year, Centro Santa Angela added modules on interculturality and on emotional health to the curriculum.

Quiritimayo Community Centre and Campesino Alternative Education Centre.

These centres, run by ACIES, offer rural and urban children afterschool educational support that values their Indigenous heritage. The project delivered reading and writing workshops 6 days a week. Children also made their own books and a bookcase they could take home. To learn about sustainability, they planted and cared for vegetables and herbs and learned about their traditional uses. A therapist offered weekly support for those children who were struggling. The project also funded knitting and gender workshops with 20 rural Indigenous women. The women sold their products in Peru and Germany.


ADY DEVELOP HER CREATIVITY!

May 28, 2023 Heart-Links Lazos de Corazón

A New Ecological Community. In 2022, Centro Santa Angela's work to "green" urban neighbourhoods in José Leonardo Ortíz moved to the neglected and underserved pueblo joven of San Miguel, whose public park had barely a single plant growing in it. The Centre ran programs for children, youth and adults to teach them about the importance of protecting our environment as well as what they can do to help. Participants developed their own environmental initiatives, such as cleaning garbage from their streets, recycling, planting trees and community gardens and rescuing parks. They also promoted environmentally responsible practices among their peers.

Support for Children in the Wake of COVID-19. Educational and nutritional gaps exacerbated by COVID-19 were the focus of this project. In the impoverished rural hamlet of Nuevo Mocupe, Madre Oliva Association provided children with afterschool educational reinforcement and a nutritional snack 6 days a week. Families in greatest need received additional food aid to offset skyrocketing food prices. Therapists offered workshops every two months to the children's parents on topics such as mental health, how to detect learning disabilities, COVID-19, and parent-child relationships. This project also included purchase of a computer and printer to strengthen Madre Oliva Association's capacity to carry out this and other projects.

Emergency Food Aid. Political upheaval in Peru in late 2022 pushed already high food and transportation prices even higher. Madre Oliva Association helped struggling families in Nuevo Mocupe get through the ongoing crisis by supplying food aid and, where prescribed, medication.

Post-pandemic Recovery in the Zaña Valley. Through monthly health clinics, vaccination campaigns, workshops on nutrition, food aid for individuals with disabilities, health fairs, and workshops for rural women on how to grow healthy, organic food, Latidos contributed to better health and food security in the valley. On the educational front, Latidos worked with children in their community library, offered added reinforcement for children with learning disabilities, held educational day camps in more rural areas, ran fun online reading and writing contests (with prizes) that involved the whole family, worked with teachers to improve their literacy teaching skills and held books fairs.

Diversifying to Prevent Hunger in San Isidro. Faced with steep inflation in food and fertilizer prices, the rural community of San Isidro decided in 2022 to further diversify their farming practices. Through this project run by Centro Esperanza, they planted a hectare of passion fruit and papaya. They also kept vegetable gardens and continued to care for and rely on their laying hens, chicks and newly acquired sheep for income and food. Centro Esperanza provided workshops in relevant agricultural practices and standards, marketing and bookkeeping. Leadership training and promoting participation by women in leadership positions and decision making continued to be a focus. Involving youth was a new priority.

In 2022, our partners spoke to Canadians at 6 different events and through 1 podcast.

Share the Love @ Home 2022. Leaders from Centro Santa Angela, Latidos and Rural Libraries joined us at our second virtual fundraiser to speak about the projects Heart-Links supports in José Leonardo Ortiz, Zaña and Cajamarca, respectively. Some 40 people tuned in for the event, which featured smooth tunes by Anthony D'Alessandro. Between donations and revenue from our online silent auction, we raised almost \$3000 for community-led projects in Peru.

Tapestry 2030 Season 2. Participants in Centro Esperanza's project to develop a sustainable farming community in San Isidro took part in Heart-Links' episode of OCIC's podcast series on the future of international cooperation and global solidarity. The focus of the season was localization. For the launch on March 24, Vitalina Flores joined community leaders from Bangladesh, Dominican Republic and Canada for a virtual panel on why localization (also referred to as community-led development) is so important in international cooperation.

Seeing the joy on the faces of our guest speakers Delicia Romero and Cecilia Odar when Sister Kitty Stafford, one of the Sisters of St. Joseph who spent many years in Peru, greeted them in Spanish was just one highlight. Heart-Links' founder Janet Zadorsky also attended, echoing Sister Kitty's good wishes for these long-time friends and collaborators. Personal long-term connections like these are a hallmark of Heart-Links' approach to international cooperation. Sheila Horrell, of our Peru Projects Committee, described the strides all our partners have made in their work to improve their communities.

Solidarity Trip Reunion x 3. For a second year, alumni of our Solidarity and Work/Awareness Trips connected by zoom with our partners in Peru to strengthen the ties of solidarity between our two countries. In order to allow participants more time to reminisce and share their experiences, we held one reunion for each of the locations where Heart-Links' partners work: Cajamarca, Chiclayo and Zaña.

IN MEMORIAM

On October 16, 2022, our dear friend and long-time ally Alfredo Mires Ortiz passed away. Alfredo was director of Heart-Links' partner the Rural Libraries Network of Cajamarca and a man of many, many accomplishments. Minga (working together), community, and solidarity with the human and natural world around us are just a few of the lessons he practised. We will miss you, Alfredo, your wisdom, your humour and your kindness. We are forever grateful for everything you have given us.



STRATEGIC GOAL

WE WILL BE AN EXCELLENT STEWARD OF DONOR FUNDS.

Heart-Links remains in a sound financial position and capable of funding our work in Peru. Our investment portfolio is independently managed by external advisors at ScotiaWealth Management, and our accounting, financial statements and reporting are subject to annual review by external auditors. All government (CRA and Corporations Canada) regulatory reporting, which is completed annually, is up to date. Administrative expenses are reasonable and within established budget.

Financial highlights for 2022:

- Fund balances as of December 31, 2022, were \$381,870.
- Project expenditures for 2022 were \$84,039. Projects approved by the Board are rigorously reviewed and monitored by the Peru Projects Committee.
- The Treasurer and Finance Committee conduct ongoing financial reviews to ensure Heart-Links' funds are managed in accordance with our bylaws and that funds allocated for charitable purposes to organizations in Peru comply with Heart-Links' standards and CRA requirements.

Investments in 2022 experienced negative growth, and like many organizations, Heart-Links continued to be impacted by COVID-19 in 2022.


